As in previous years the biggest fashion must is comfort for the 1990-1991 school year. The tee shirts and jeans of the past are still a favorite among L.H.S students.

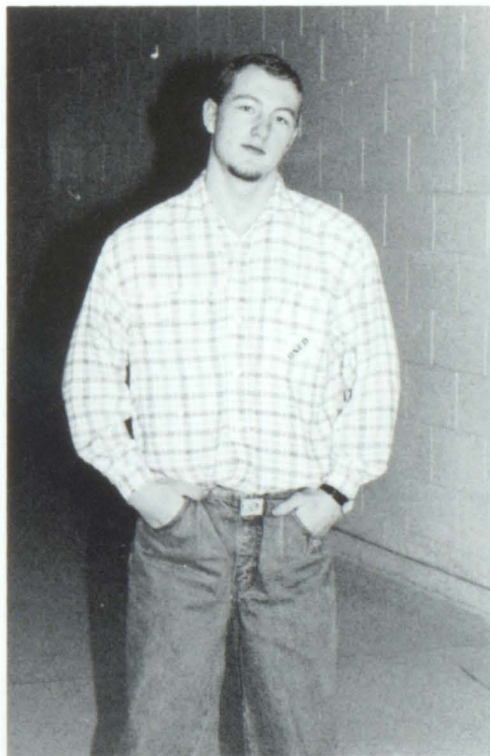

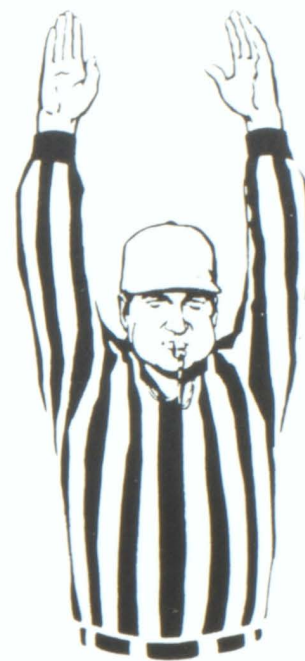

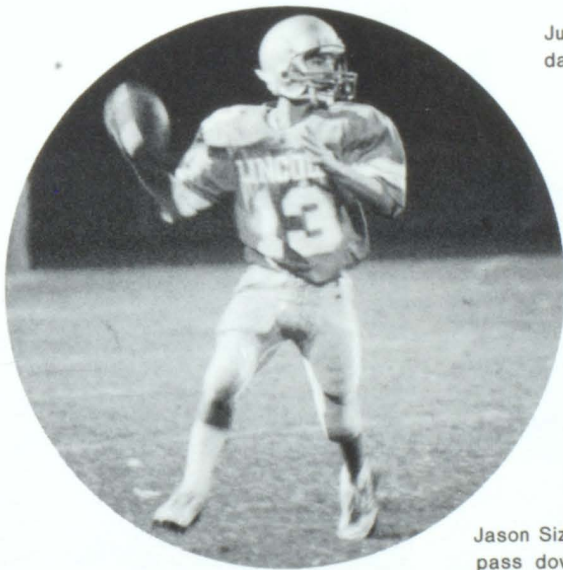

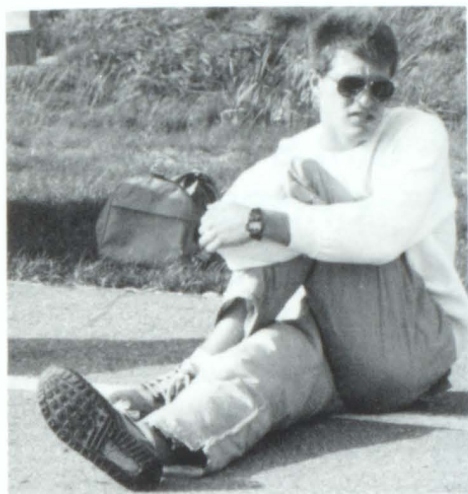

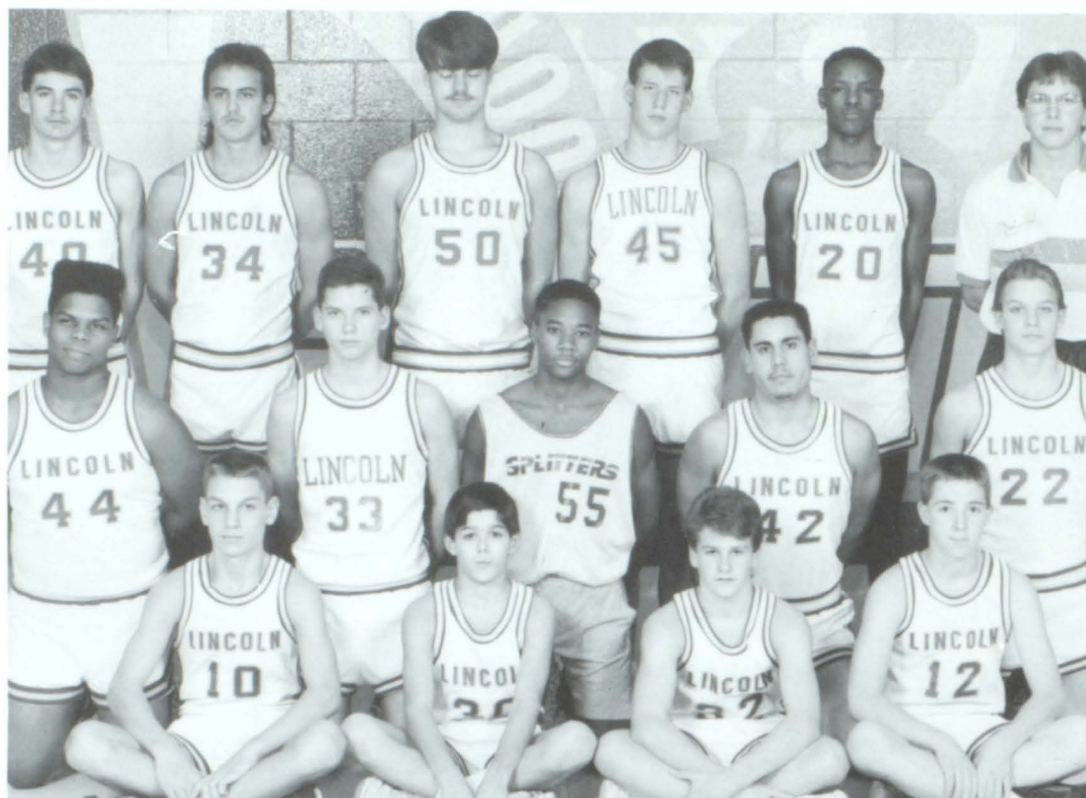

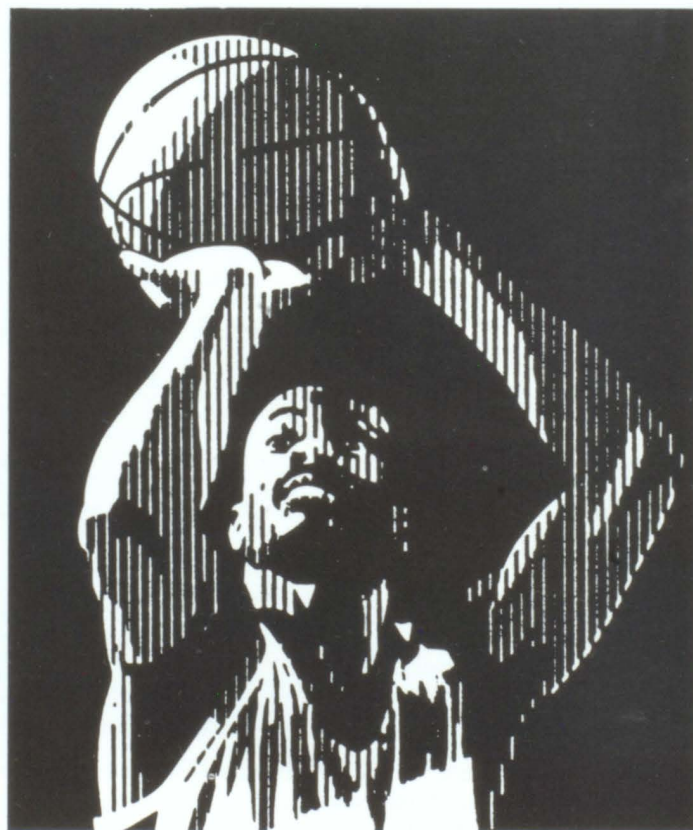

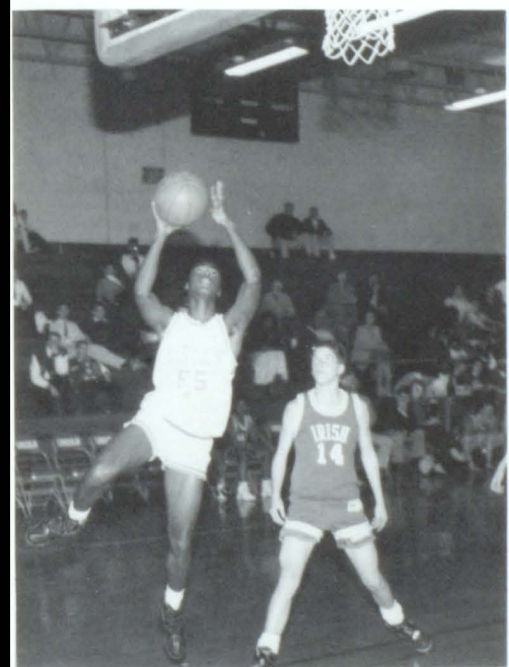

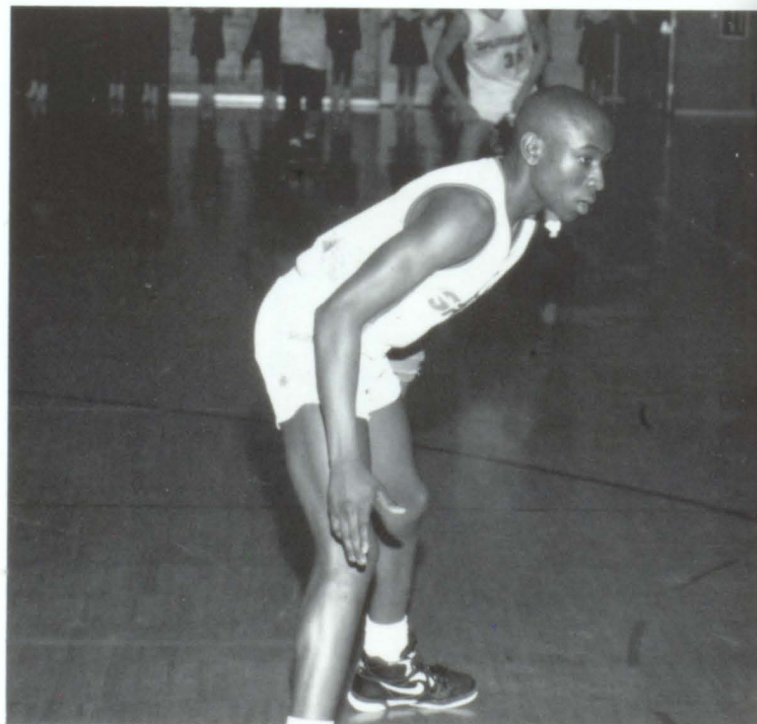

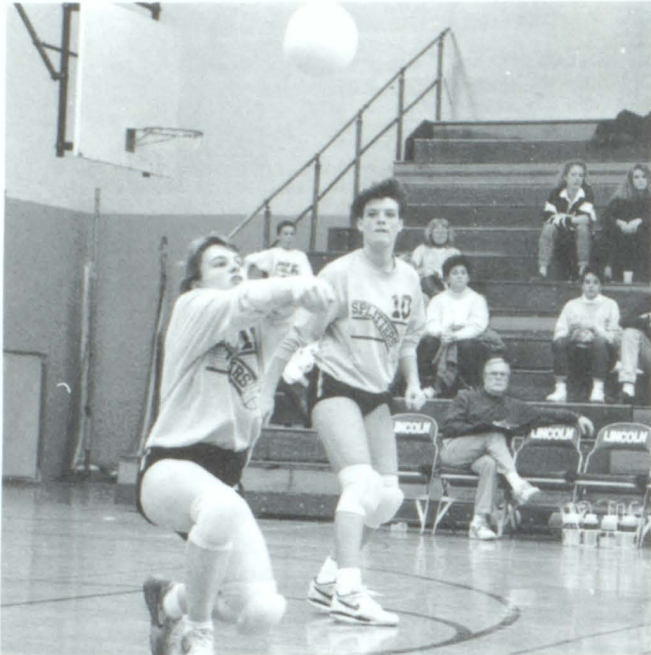

Senior Amy Kimbrell said, "I wish we would've had a more successful season, but we had a lot of fun, and that's what the game is for."

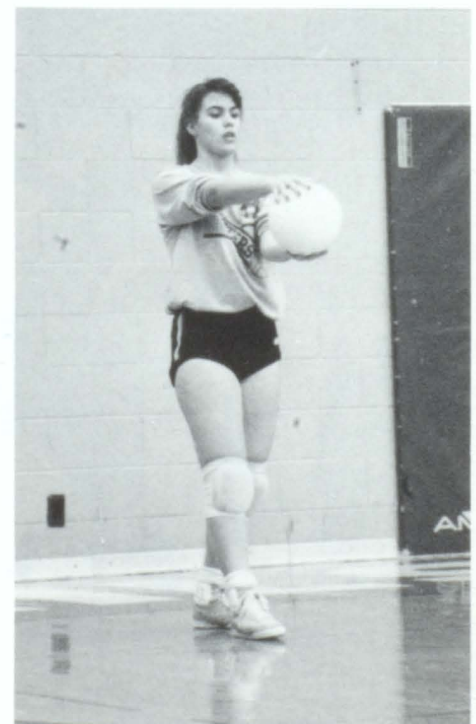

As Sungwoo Baek says "Wrestling is a sport where what you put in is what you get out." This year's team must have put a lot in.

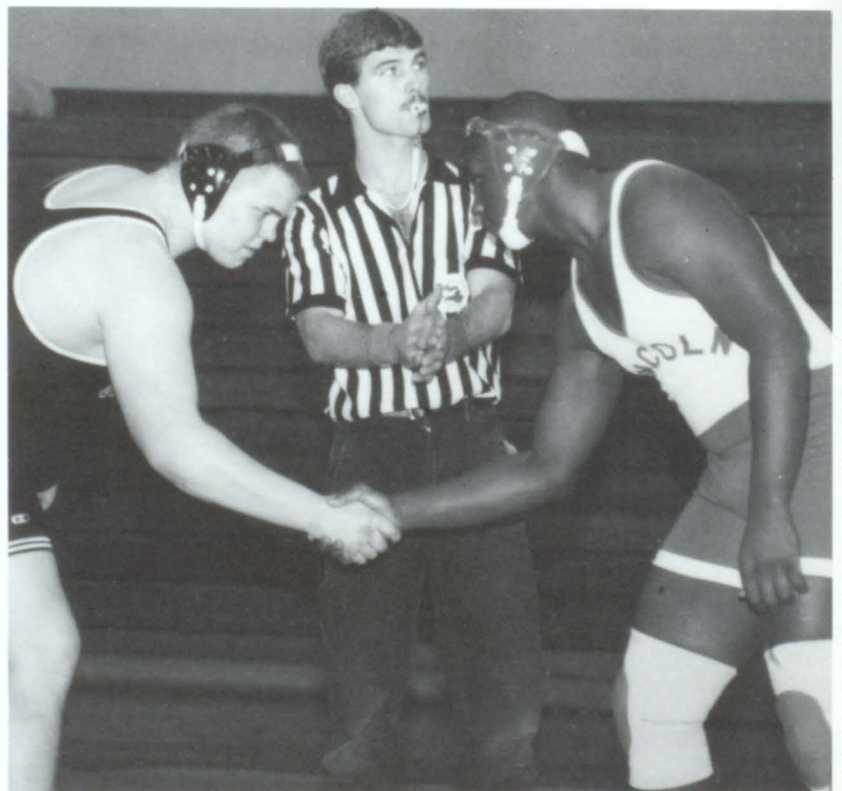

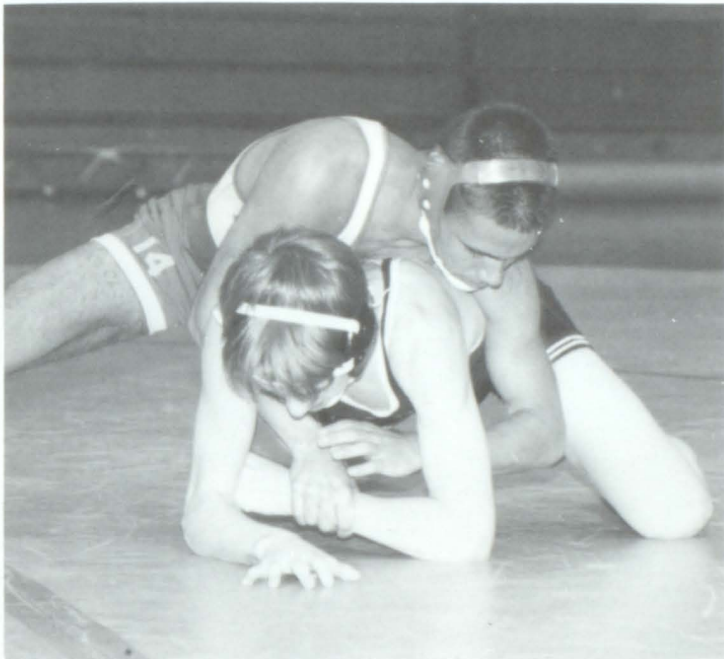

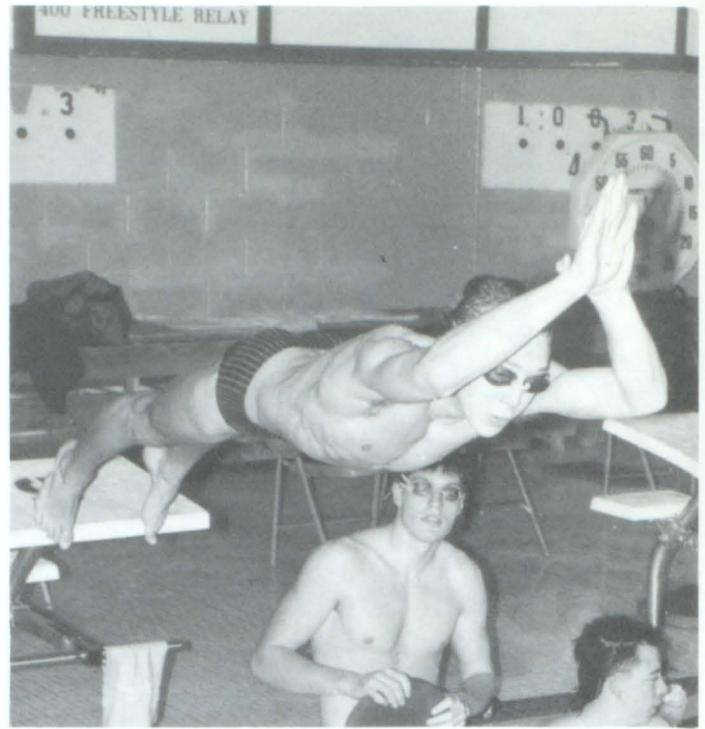

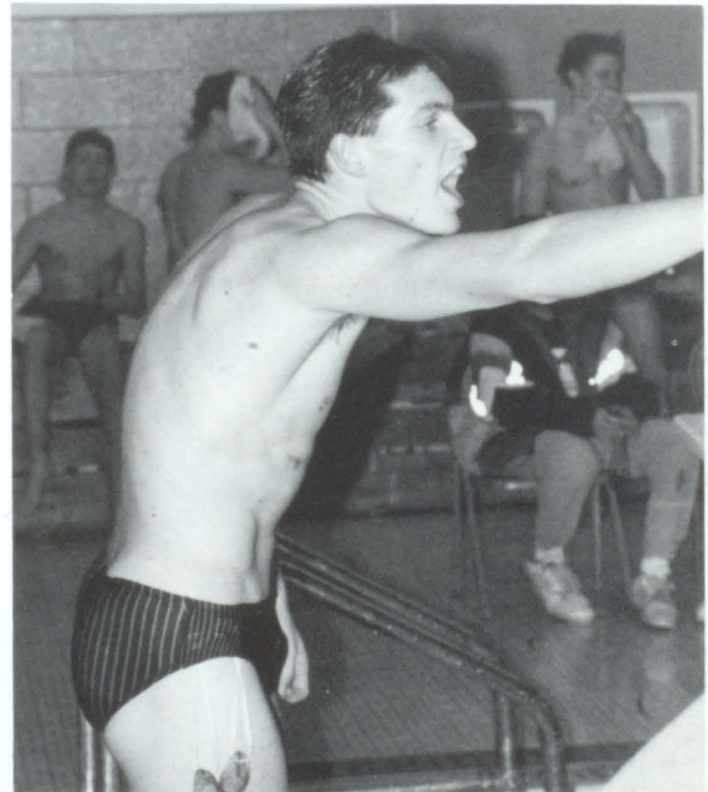

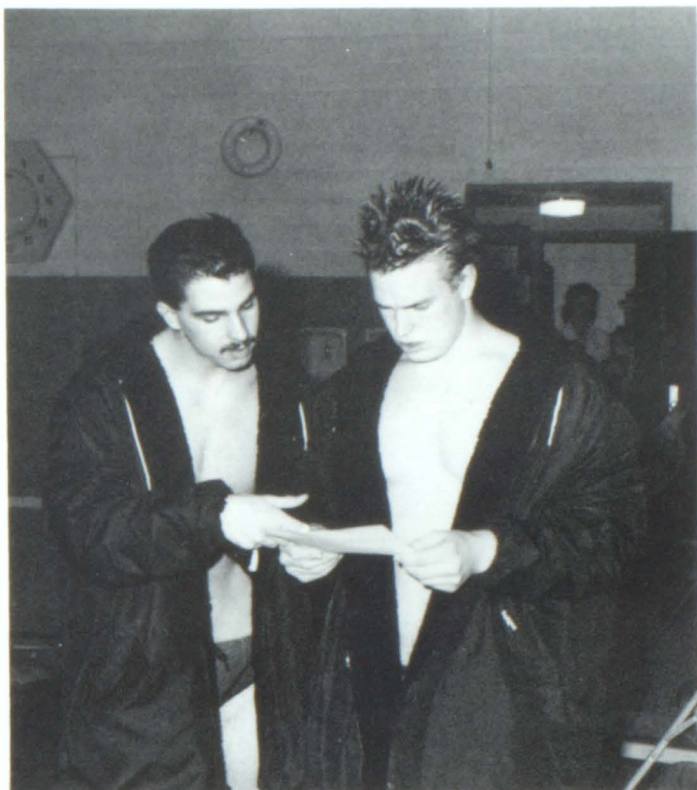

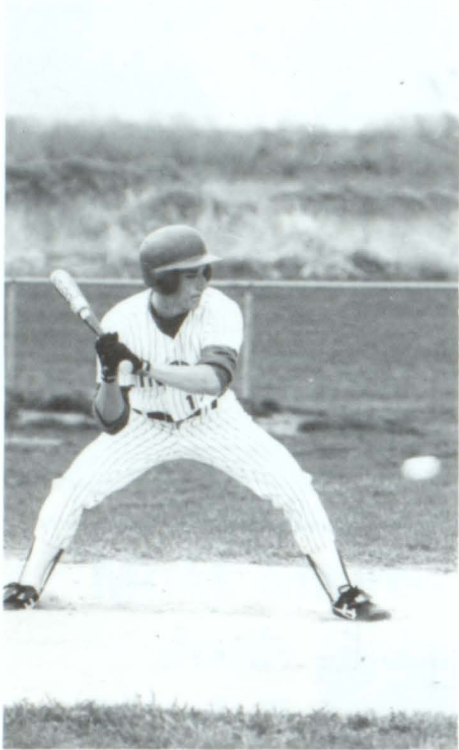

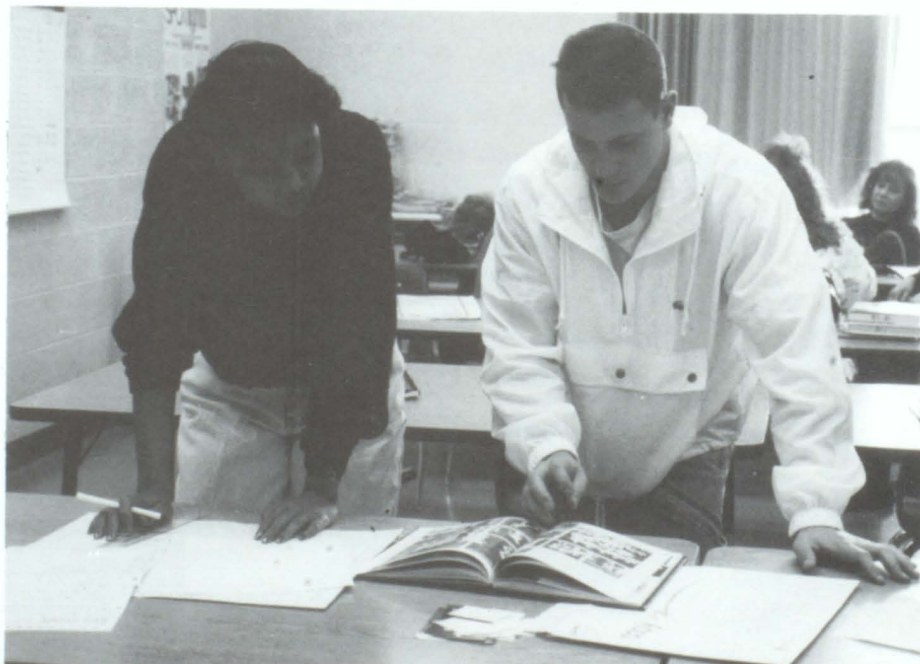

Carol won second place for her personality profile on Ms. Rouseff, our interim principal for the 1990-91 school year.

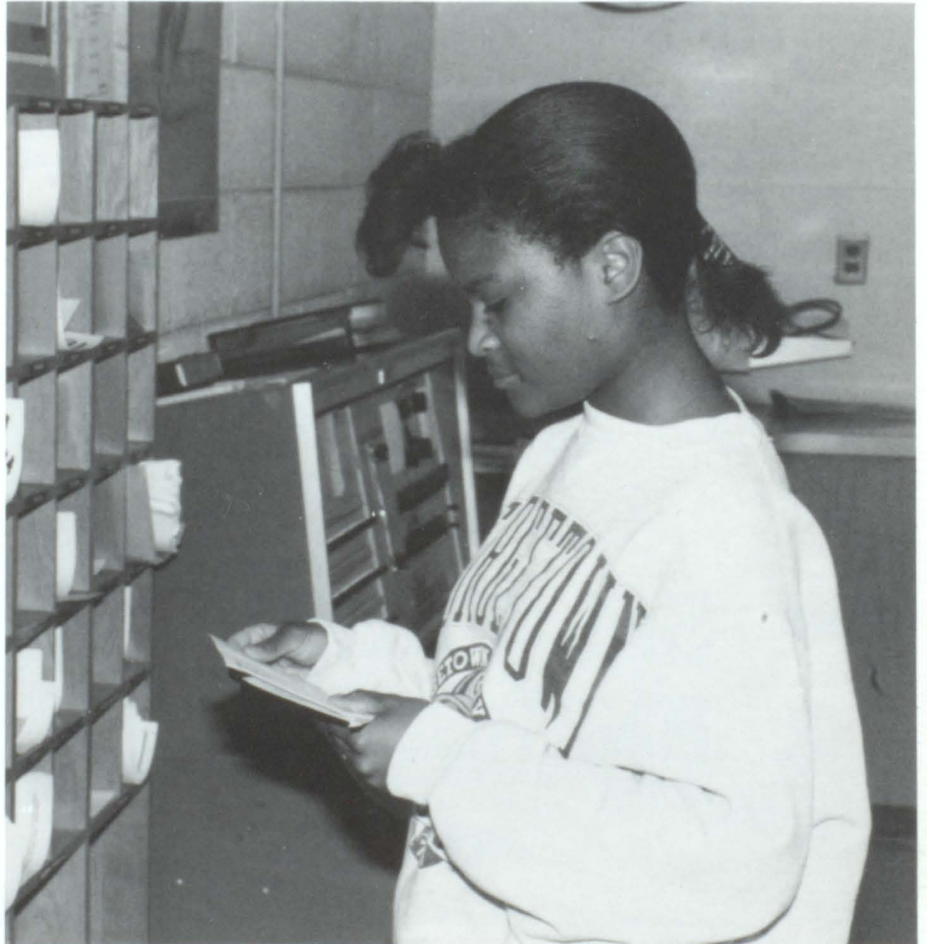
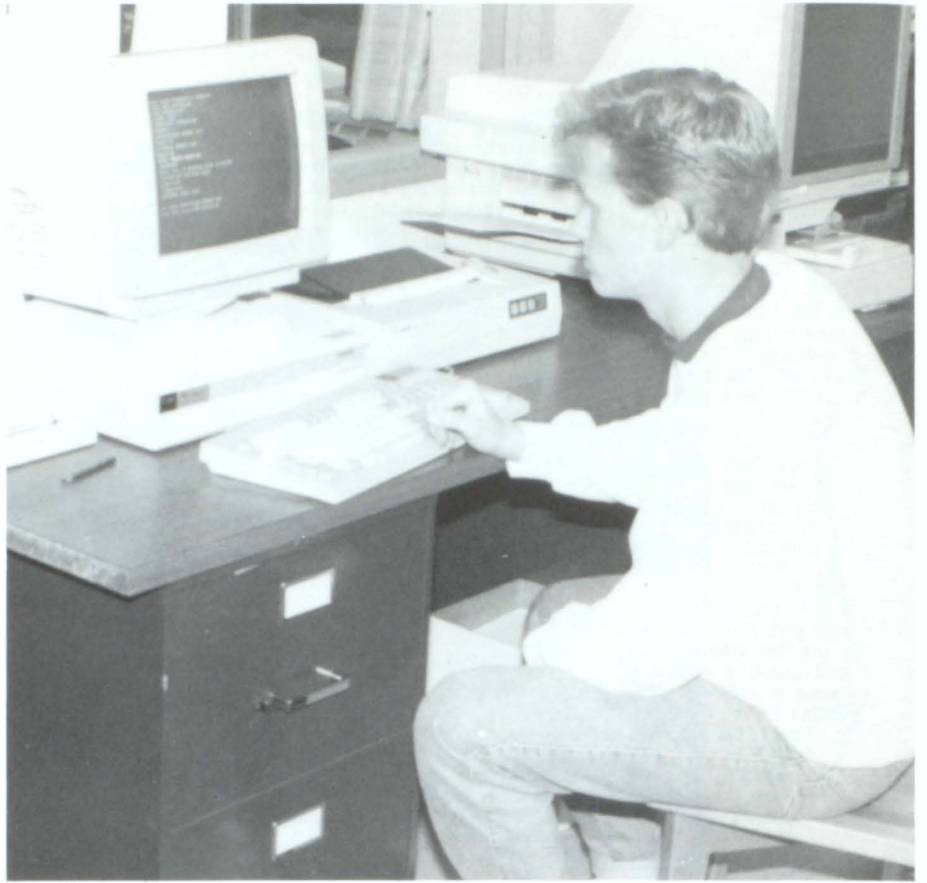

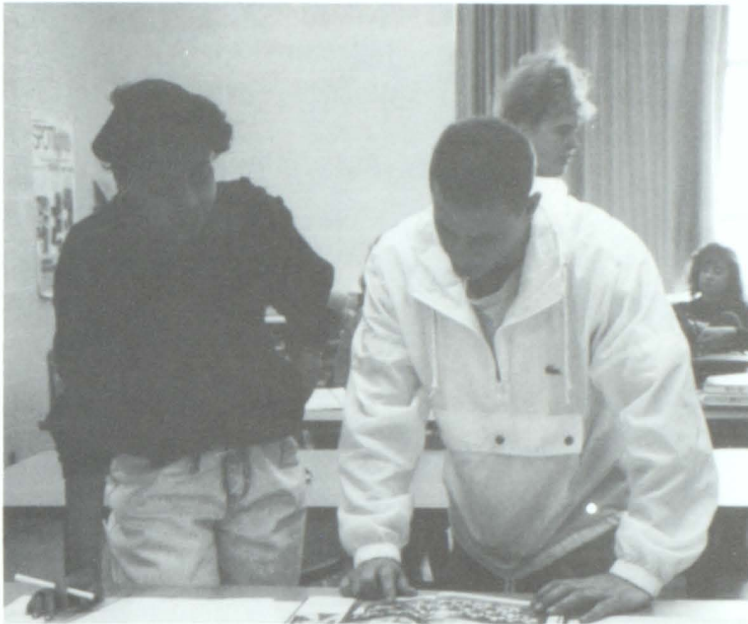
The Lincoln H.S. Band held a banquet and concert to honor George and Kay Wertman.

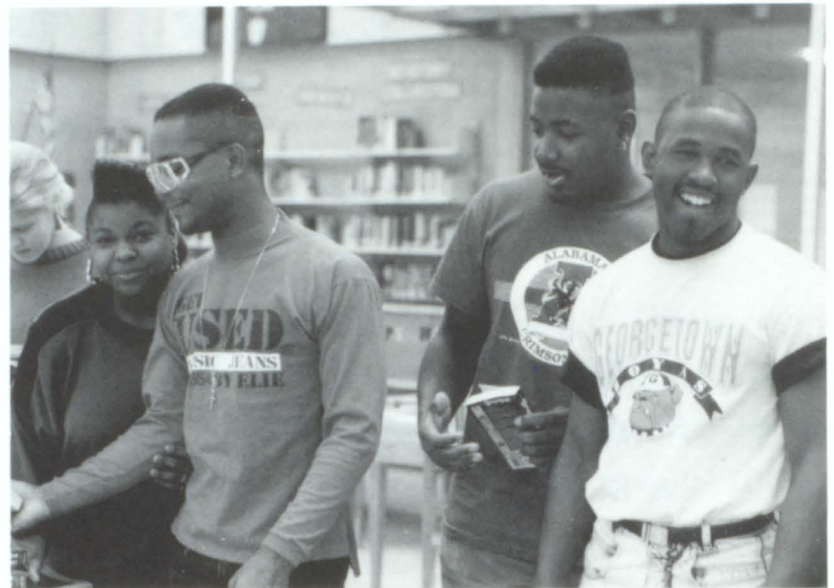
RIF: Students Get 2,400 Books Worth \$12,500 Thanks to Local Businesses!

Anyone watching students rush into the library for **RIF** days can easily see that students like reading, if they can pick the materials. Three times a year they can pick a book they want to read and keep it! Books average \$5 each which calculates to \$12,500 worth of free books for the students.

RIF, Reading is Fundamental, a federal program to promote reading provides about 55% of the funds needed to buy the books and magazines. The rest of the money comes from sponsors.

What's Popular?

Students are surveyed to find out what they want to read. The diversity of their interests shows in their reading choices. Stephen King's adventures top the list, but books and magazines of many different types are popular. Students choose from over 500 different titles. Magazines on music, film stars, motorcycles and sports are quickly selected. A wide range of adventures, science fiction yarns, Garfield's antics, mysteries, horror tales, romances, hobby information and classics are also in demand. Books by Afro-American writers are another popular group.

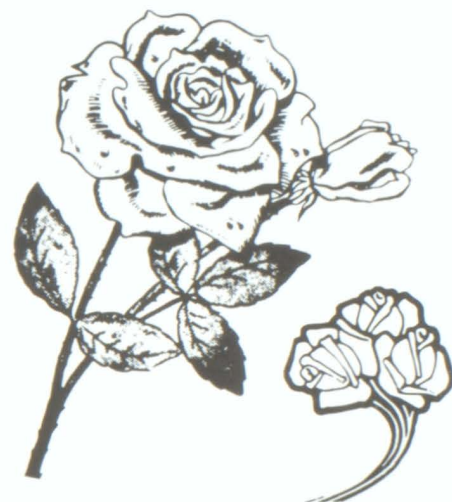

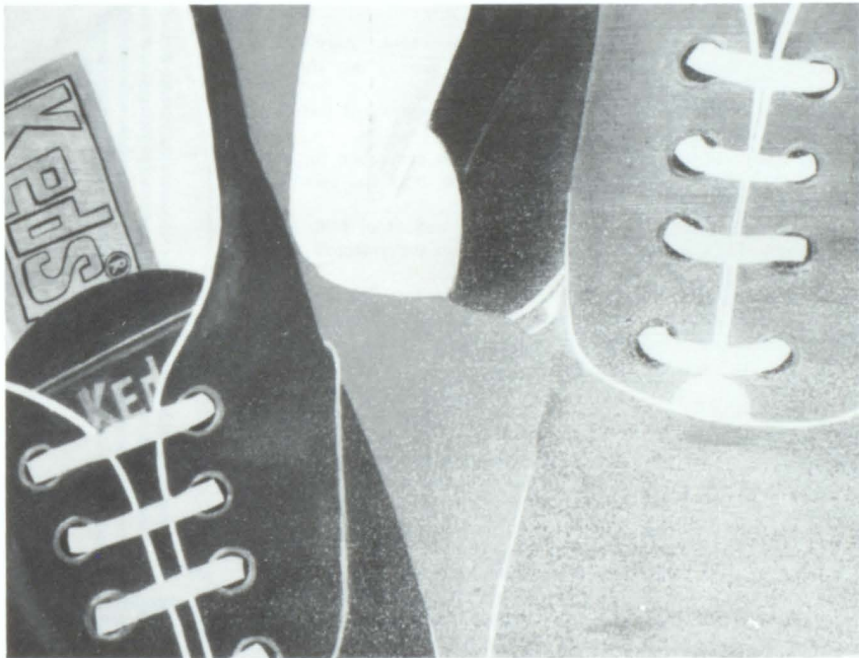

As the Senior Class motto states: "It is time for a new generation of leadership ..."

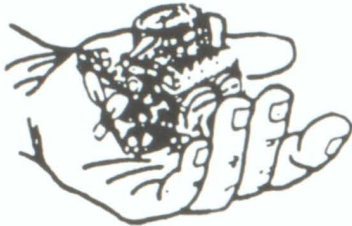
With the kind of focus, dedication, and discipline of students like these, the graduating class is producing leaders who can cope with the problems of the new world that awaits them.
